Canterbury City Council:Summary of accounts for year ending 31 March 2013

Our accounts show you how we are managing the money we receive to provide services to residents and visitors and to look after our environment.

The full and audited Statement of Accounts is prepared using proper accounting practice. The style and content can be difficult to follow if you are not an accountant. This summary gives the key information in a simpler and more meaningful way and some modifications have been made in order to do this.

Our Revenue account shows the cost of services for the year and where the money came from to pay for them.

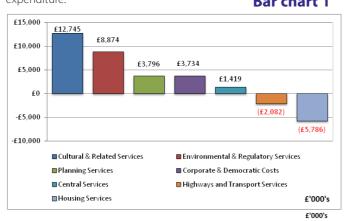

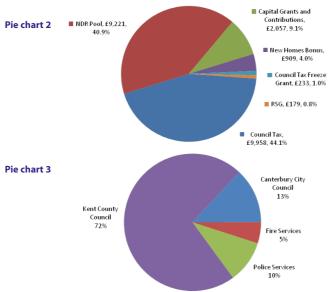

What we spent

Bar chart 1 shows the net expenditure for each of the main service areas. (see number 1 in table 1) as a percentage of the council's total expenditure. **Bar chart 1**





Where the money came from

Pie chart 2 shows the income from grants and Council Tax as a percentage of the total (see number 2 in table 1)

The Revenue Support Grant (RSG) is money paid directly to us from central government.

Non-domestic Rates (NDR) are paid by businesses in the Canterbury district. These are paid into a central government pool and redistributed to local authorities. The £9,221,000 is our share of the pool this year. The Council Tax Income is the proportion we keep from the total we collect.

The Council Tax Freeze grant is a grant paid by government to councils that voluntarily do not increase their Council Tax rates

The New Homes Bonus is a grant paid by government for new homes and empty properties brought back into use

Where does the rest of your Council Tax go?

We hold the Council Tax in a separate fund because it is collected on behalf of Kent County Council, the police and the fire service as well as to help pay for our own services. **Pie chart 3** shows how it is distributed. We only keep 13% per year of what you pay to us.

The cost of housing services

The Housing Revenue Account (HRA) is also a separately maintained account showing the cost of running the council's housing stock, used to accommodate council tenants. It is separately financed by rents and service charges. We currently have 5,231 properties in the Canterbury district.

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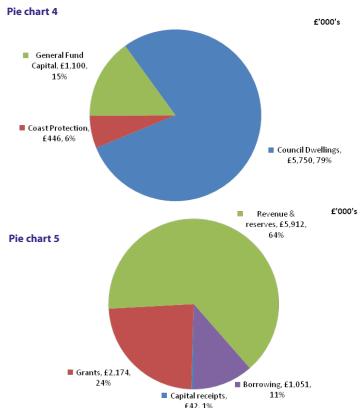
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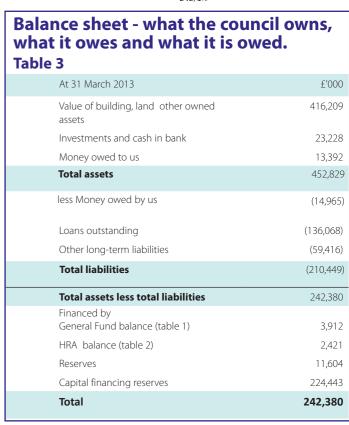
Capital spending
